NSW Rowing Championships

I found myself full of admiration for our rowing crews last weekend as they showcased their commitment to their sport at the NSW Rowing Championships. The personal best times recorded by the three crews that raced were outshone by their exhibition of resilience and positive mindsets in challenging circumstances. After a late night of driving from Armidale and waiting for swags to arrive at Riverview the Sydney heat wave caused the first race to be brought forward to 7:00am and the TAS crews to be up at 4:00am to travel across to Penrith. For our girls' crew the disappointment continued as their race scheduled for later in the day was cancelled and they had to settle for an early practice row on the course before the start of the races. I doubt that any other crews faced similar conditions leading up to this major event, yet there was not a word of complaint from our rowers. Instead, they simply got on with the job and openly appreciated the opportunity to be there. It was a lesson in positivity that deserves to be applauded and I recognise them for it.



Last weekend 67 boys and girls attended the first weekend of the 2017 cadet leaders course for aspiring CUOs, sergeants and corporals. This is the highest number volunteering for this leadership training that I can remember and, of course, it included the first intake of girls as cadet leaders. The weekend covered the theory component of the course, including navigation, fieldcraft, communication, leadership, public speaking and drill techniques, as well as the customs and traditions of the Australian Army Cadets and The Armidale School Cadet Unit. This coming weekend will see the same group put those theoretical skills into play in the bush with day and night navigation, fieldcraft, teamwork and initiative, whilst also building individual resilience. All reports are that the group is performing very well thus far and I wish them well for the remainder of the course.

This elite team is selected by the Australian Polo Federation and is a pathway to senior representation. Combating poverty

In the school holidays I had the privilege of spending 3 weeks in Cambodia, a country I had never visited before. I went with a group of 18 people from across Australia with a Christian Development organisation called TEAR AUSTRALIA.

This was not about volunteering, but rather we went to learn. We went to learn about the Cambodian partner organisations that TEAR support and about Cambodia herself- her history, her politics, her people and the complexities many are facing. The projects we visited ranged from savings groups through to chicken farming and education programs and water projects and to community advocacy groups.

I can't begin to explain how profoundly moved and humbled I was on so many occasions. Our days were filled with meeting Cambodians from partner organisations or with visiting villagers or communities in both urban and rural areas. As I sat on mats feeling somewhat overwhelmed by the challenges these people faced, and angry at the acute unfairness of it all I also grappled with the notion of poverty in both our contexts. The poverty in front of me was obvious and confronting. However some of it was as fundamental as 'We don't have enough water, so have to spend all our money to bring it to our village.' 'We can't grow crops when the rains come early or not at all.' 'I can't send my child to school, because there isn't one anywhere near me and I couldn't afford it even if there was.' 'We have no voice and the local governor does nothing to help us.'

The Cambodian organisations we met were working with people to empower them to be able to address or at least cope a little better with all these realities. They were in the business of addressing aspects of poverty.

The thing we kept hearing over and over and the bit that gave hope amid all the difficulties was when families within villages were joining together and creating support networks through saving groups or community action groups. It wasn't just the access to small loans or the empowerment that comes from being able to take control, but from the act of coming together to forge bonds and community ties that combats those feelings of hopelessness, alienation and loneliness. It was this that stirred my heart.

Too often we in Australia over simplify, and make 'poverty' simply about economics, but in a country with one of the highest standards of living in the world alongside some of the highest rates of suicide and mental health challenges, there's clearly more complexity. The truth is, most of us instinctively know 'poverty' comes in different forms, but whether it be economic or emotional a sense of belonging and community is fundamental to providing hope and ways of alleviating some of the effects of poverty.



I know spending time in Cambodia has challenged me in a whole range of ways and I am still working through what I do with it all, but a by-product of this experience is an increased desire to see community and a sense of belonging grow and develop in our own context. I am the first to say I want to see our students recognise big issues of justice, to learn empathy as they grapple to understand the challenges of our world, but I also want them to see building community and their active participation in that as a stepping stone to combating the poverty of hopelessness, loneliness, and heart suffering in our own corner of the world. We may not be able to fix poverty on a global scale or make huge dents in economic poverty for millions across the world, but care and compassion for the person sitting next to us in class, or sleeping in a bed down the hall, or performing on stage next to us....that we can all do. Mother Theresa once said 'We think poverty is only being hungry and naked and homeless. The poverty of being unwanted unloved and uncared for is the greatest poverty.'

So, here at TAS, my prayer is that each of us realises that our choices to care for others day by day makes us partners in combating poverty in our own context.



PDHPE - Non Uniform

As you may be aware the PDHPE program at TAS has two components, these being the practical and theory courses. Practicals are conducted in the double periods and theory classes in the single periods. The only exception is the first three weeks of term one where all classes are practical in order to complete the required physical tests.

For the practical lessons, students are required to bring the schools PE/sports uniform to class. Students are not permitted to participate in the practical classes without the required change for health and safe reasons. In an attempt to assist the student participate when they don't have the required uniform, the school has adopted a policy of hiring items of clothing to those students who, for whatever reason, fail to bring the uniform to class. The charges for the hire are added to the students account at the end of each term. This policy allows the students to participate in the class and act as a reminder for the next practical lesson.

This year we have been able to develop a system of informing the parents/guardians when their child has failed to bring the required uniform. This is simply an information sharing exercise to inform parents/guardians on the day that it occurs rather than wait to the end of term. This will be delivered in the form of a non-reply email. The email will list the charges for the uniform hire and gives the parents/guardians the opportunity to support their child in remembering the required uniform for the next occasion. The students are only charged for those items that they hire. The cost of hiring all four items is a total of \$10. The individual hire charges are: shoes \$5, Shirt \$2, shorts \$2 and socks \$2 (students keep socks after the class).

We believe that organisational skills and preparedness for class are essential for students to gain from all the educational opportunities afforded to them at TAS. We are seeking the assistance of the parent/guardian body to help achieve these goals for their students.

If at any time the students cannot bring the required uniform (damage, wash, lost) then students can bring a suitable alternative (house shirt) with an explanatory note from parents/ guardians. Please note that green and grey socks are not part of the PE/Sports uniform and will not be permitted to be worn in practical classes.

I hope this clarifies the policy as we have had some level of confusion in the first two weeks and we are hoping that it will assist the students to bring the required uniform when needed and we lessen the need to hire uniform to students in the future.

Family Ties

If you have any questions about the process, please speak to your child's Homeroom Teacher who will be able to advise you about the best ways to facilitate the process of homework completion and assignment / assessment preparation. What I like about this initiative is that it gives us opportunity to support and guide Middle School students to the realization of good study habits over time. The success of this issue is dependent on mutually supportive communications between us. The schedule is reasonable in terms of time allocations for all subjects and sensitive to the needs and interests of younger students in that again, very pleasing for a teacher of English, there is provision for reading time, especially at the end of each week.

Please look carefully at the Looking Ahead section of the Junior School section of TAS Talks with a view of being able to drop in and join us when you can.


Leadership in Junior School


They have been for a tour of the Junior School and know where the other classes are located.
