Have you ever lied to yourself? 1 John 1

Today we continue in our series inspired by The National Geographic article entitled; 'Why We Lie?'

Have you ever told such a comprehensive pork pie, such an elaborate story, sewn a web of deceit that in the end you even start to believe it? Like the middled aged, average at best, past 'sportsman', AKA nearly every male TAS member of staff, whose distorted memory of his own exploits is so carved in his mind as glorious he has forgotten reality, this is encapsulated in the famous saying; "the older I am, the faster I was." We can be very easily deceived by ourselves.

Some the world's most famous thinkers agree:

"Lying to ourselves is more deeply ingrained than lying to *others." Fyodor Dostoyevsky*

"Of all the liars in the world, sometimes the worst are our own fears." *Rudyard Kipling, The Collected Works*

"The visionary lies to himself, the liar only to others." *Friedrich Nietzsche*

"The best lies about me are the ones I told." Patrick Rothfuss, The Name of the Wind

"There are two ways to be fooled. One is to believe what isn't true; the other is to refuse to believe what is true." *Søren Kierkegaard*

According to the reading, the truth is we all sin. Now, we might debate this, you might, for instance think, "I'm not so bad... I don't do this or that" and its all about comparisons with others. However, the Biblical definition of sin has less to do with comparisons and doing things that might be considered naughty or nice, as you may have when thinking of Santa. Rather it's far more about whether or not we have done what Jesus described as the summary of all of God's laws – have we loved God with all our being, and have we loved the people around us as much as I love myself? You see it's about relationships, not so much a list of achievements or demerits. The thing is, none of us perfectly love – not those around us, let alone God, thus, we all sin. As long as we say we don't sin, or put another way – "I'm not such a bad person – God will be happy with me," we make God out to be a liar. The great irony being, that we are lying to ourselves. Let's be honest, with ourselves and with God, let us seek His solution, and find forgiveness.

LEADERSHIP, SERVICE AND ADVENTURE

Cadets: Activities Day 5 (1 September)

Activities Day 5 will be held on 1 September, Friday of Week 7. The process began with an activity briefing during Period 3 on Tuesday 29 August.

The activities will be conducted as follows:

A Company

1 & 2 Platoons – Kayak touring on Clarence River near Copmanhurst; 3 Platoon will meet for roll call and depart at 3:30pm on Sunday 18 June. An overnight bivouac will be conducted, and students will require overnight gear as specified below.

3 Platoon – Echidna Gully & Trek/Navigation.

B Company

4, 5 & 6 Platoons – Firearms safety training (TAS Rifle Club activity), navigation, first aid and bush cooking to be conducted at 'Loch Abba' property. Cadets should ensure that they bring their issued cadet jumper in addition to equipment mentioned in the activity briefing.

C Company

7, 8, 9 & 10 Platoons – Navigation, fieldcraft, bush cooking and abseiling to be conducted at 'Newholme' property and Baker's Creek Gorge.

PYP PROGRAMME, MRS VERONICA WATERS

Year 3 have just complete a Unit of Inquiry (UOI) based on ideas explored in the transdisciplinary descriptor 'How we Express Ourselves'.

The central idea for this unit was 'People tell stories, express themselves and entertain through performance.'

The students were given opportunities to explore what makes a performance and explored some common examples of performances, focusing mainly on some varied forms of puppetry.

They were involved in class discussions about the various reasons people perform and what some of the emotions, feelings and reactions to performances may be from both the perspective of the performer and the audience.

Time was spent investigating what makes a performance successful, which formed the basis for a list of five key criteria that informed the students' planning, reflection and evaluation of their own performances conducted at the Week 5 Year 2 Junior School Assembly.

The unit was transdisciplinary with elements of Science being explored, namely light, English as scripts were planned, drafted, published and performed and French. As part of French, students performed the rhyme 'Le Petit Marionette' with Madame Perrin-Baker. They also performed a selection of Gyre & Gimble paper puppet movements, requiring three students per puppet; sock puppet monologues 'How I became odd'; shadow puppet animals; and a presentation of some modern interpretations of Indonesian Weyang Puppetry, made by the students.

General Information about Summer Sports (available to Junior School students for Summer 2017/2018)

Junior School students will be choosing their summer sport this week. With this in mind, a description of the various options appears below.

Junior School Policy re Participation in Sport

All students in Year 3 and above will participate in one summer sport in Terms 4 and Term 1, 2018. Students in Year 2 and below do not have to participate but are encouraged to do so. If students in Year 2 or below do participate they will commit to the sport (including training sessions) for the duration of that season. Training times and sessions vary depending on the chosen sport.

Description of Sports

Cricket:

To make cricket enjoyable and fun, different age groups play according to different rules. All games are played on Saturday mornings. Registration and insurance fees apply. See separate cricket groups for costings.

The different competitions are:

Milo In 2 Cricket/'Kanga' for U6s:

'Milo In 2 Cricket' (skills development) will be conducted up until Christmas. This will be played on TAS Cricket Oval between 9:15am and 10:15am. It will mainly be for 5 and 6 year olds with the option of 7 year olds playing if they wish. Term 4 is usually working on skills and Term 1, 2018 will be starting games. Kanga Cricket is played between two teams on two adjacent 'fields' (still on TAS Cricket Oval) so that both innings go on at the same time. Games start at 9:00am and finish around 10:30am. Teams consist of 12 players (24 over game). At any one time there should be 2 batting on Field 1, 8 fielding on Field 2 and 2 preparing to bat. Players bat in pairs for 4 overs. Children turning 7 and 8 years of age are encouraged to play U9s cricket, rather than Kanga, if they have the desire and ability. Cost will be approx. \$86 for the season.

'Average Cricket' for U9s:

(players must be under 9 on 1 September 2017) Teams consist of 8 players per side. Games start at 9:00am and finish by 11:10am (2 hour games). Each team faces 16 overs. The team's score is determined by dividing the number of runs scored by the number of wickets lost, plus one. The higher average score wins the match. Each player must bowl two overs. Cost will be approx. \$86 for the season.

'One-day matches' for U11s:

(players must be under 10 or under 11 on 1 September 2017) Teams consist of 11 players per side. Games start at 9:00am and finish by 12:10pm. The first innings is limited to 25 six-ball overs per team. No more than 50 overs shall be bowled in a match. Each player must bowl a minimum of two overs with a maximum of three overs. A batsman must retire when his score reaches 20. Cost will be approx. \$97 for the season.

'Two-day matches' for 12s:

(players must be under 12 on 1 September 2017) Teams consist of 11 players per side. Games start at 9:00am and finish by 12:10pm. A team's innings consists of 50 overs, with each team batting and bowling for 25 overs on each of the two days. Each player must bowl a minimum of one over with a maximum of four overs. A batsman must retire when his score reaches 50. Trainings will be Monday and Wednesdays. Cost will be approx. \$97 for the season.

Swimming: This is not for beginners.

In choosing this sport, children should be able to competently swim at least two laps of the TAS pool (preferably in all four strokes). (Parents wanting 'Learn to Swim' lessons for their children are encouraged to contact the TAS Sports Centre on 6776 5866, to arrange lessons). All swimmers will train in the TAS pool on Thursdays from 3:45pm to 4:45pm. The instructor concentrates on stroke correction and improving fitness. Additionally, students are expected to join the TAS based 'Alligators Swim Club' (approx. \$75 for the season) which holds Club nights every Wednesday night at the TAS pool from 6:30pm to 7:30pm. These are not only good opportunities to improve fitness and speed but are good social occasions as well. Costs will be \$10 per week and the Alligators membership.

Gymnastics: K-3

Held at the Armidale Gymnasium. The sessions will be on Mondays from 3:50 – 4:50pm run by qualified Level 1 coaches provided by Armidale Gymnastics Club. The cost is approximately \$190 for the season (Term 4 and Term 1, 2018). Children will travel by TAS minibus to and from the gym with staff members supervising all sessions and travel.

Tennis: Years K- 5

Hot Shots Tennis program.

Students will participate in the MLC Tennis Hot Shots, led by Mr Justin Sheriff. There will be two levels of the program offered. 'Hot Shots Red Ball' will be for beginners, and suited to students aged 5-8. (T-Yr 2) This will be held on Monday afternoons from 4:00pm - 4.45pm. Students in the Red stage play on a smaller court, use a larger ball, which doesn't bounce as high.

Students in Years 3 and above will participate in '3-5 Red and Orange Ball'. Training will also be held on Monday afternoons from 4:00pm - 4.45pm. The Orange stage of the program is also on a reduced court size and the ball has less compression.

These small group lessons are for four players @ \$128 for eight weeks. Each small group will have their own tennis coach for these sessions.

Ball Skills: Transition – Year 2

This training session is for T-2 only and will be based around the ball skills required for games such as tennis, cricket, basketball and netball. Children will participate in the Monday afternoon training session at TAS.

Basketball: Years 3-5

It is anticipated that Armidale Basketball Association will run two competitions: one for combined Yr 5/6 teams and one for combined Yr 3/4 teams. Games will be held at the Armidale High School Den from 4:00pm for Years 3/4 and from 5pm for Years 5/6 on Mondays. (Times yet to be confirmed) Trainings will be on Wednesdays at TAS. Registration fees are approximately \$110 per season.

Indoor Hockey

Indoor Hockey games will occur on Friday afternoons between the hours of 4-7pm. Training sessions will occur on Monday afternoons at TAS. Costs are yet to be advised.

Note that students who move into Year 6 at TAS in 2018, will continue to play the chosen sport from Term 4, 2017.

This is no luxurious travel; 10 days of riding a postie bike, with a top speed of 75km/hr, averaging 300km per day, daily servicing of her own bike and sleeping in a tent at night. It must be said, she had to get her motor bike licence to participate in this event and will be doing so with L plates!

Alix is using this opportunity to fulfill a personal goal of raising money for Childhood Cancer Support (CCS) which have so generously supported the Holland family with emotional support and a comfortable and safe place to stay while their daughter Lucy receives treatment in Brisbane.

Childhood Cancer Support (CCS) is a not-for-profit organisation which, for the past 40 years, has been dedicated to providing families affected by childhood cancer with a place to live that looks and feels like home. Childhood Cancer Support is a family focused charity, founded by a dedicated group of parents who realised there was an urgent need to provide a safe and familyfocused environment for regional families whilst their child undergoes life-saving cancer treatment in Brisbane. Childhood Cancer Support primarily supports regional families who find it difficult to access affordable accommodation while their child is undergoing treatment. The average stay for our families is approximately a demanding and challenging 6-10 months. As many of you will know, the Holland family are quite a large part of the School with Lucy a much loved student in Year 3, Julie in the Medical Centre and Michael the Director of Boarding.

Lucy was diagnosed in November 2016 and they have been staying in CCS units since November, 2016 and are not likely to leave until December 2017. It costs CCS \$1,000 per month to support a family, so that will be close to \$14,000 to provide accommodation and support during their stay.

We are asking the TAS community to dig deep and support the organisation who is supporting one of our own.

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
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
