FIRST AID COURSE - compulsory for all Year 10 students - Week 9

Year 10 will be completing the practical section of their First Aid Course in groups of around 20 students on an allocated day next week in the McConville Centre. Classes will be as normal for the other four days of the week. The theory component will need to be done online in order to complete the qualification and students will be given all the necessary information to carry this out. The cost of the course will be charged to student accounts.

From 1 January 2015, the Australian Government requires any students undertaking nationally recognised training to have a Unique Student Identifier (USI). This means that every student completing a First Aid course will require one of these numbers. Your son or daughter should have gained their USI through Careers classes this year. UAC Applications

UAC Applications close on Friday 29 September 2017. Ensure your application is submitted by this due date to avoid late fees. You are still able to change your preferences up until 17 December for consideration in December Round 2 when Guaranteed Entry offers will be made.

Student Recommendation Schemes

Schools Recommendation Schemes (SRS) are one way institutions make early offers of undergraduate admission, using criteria other than (or in addition to) the ATAR. After you've applied to UAC for undergraduate admission, you can apply for SRS using your UAC application number and UAC PIN. You can only submit one application. There is no separate charge to apply for SRS.

Southern Cross University

Student registrations for Southern Cross University Early Entry has been extended until 15 September. Students will be notified of the outcome of their STAR application by email from 13 November. Successful STAR applicants will receive their offer direct from the University.

Year 11 End of Course Exams

Year 11 End of Course exams will be held next week (Week 9). Students and parents have received a copy of the exam timetable.

Full school uniform is to be worn to every exam and students should arrive at the exam venue at least 15 minutes before the scheduled exam start time. If a student is unwell and unable to attend an exam they should contact Reception as soon possible and collect an Appeal Form as soon as they return to school - a doctor's certificate must be supplied.

Dear Parents of students in Years 3,5,7 and 9

Next week your child will be involved in NAPLAN Online readiness tests. These will be conducted in the areas of Writing and an Omnibus test; comprising of elements from the reading, conventions of language and numeracy domains.

The school readiness test is a 'practice run' for schools to assess their technology ahead of NAPLAN Online which will come into effect in 2018. The readiness test is not an assessment of student ability, but aims to allow schools to; become familiar with the NAPLAN Online test format and processes; check whether they have the technical capacity, rooms and devices to administer NAPLAN Online and to provide students in NAPLAN Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 with the opportunity to experience the online test question types and format.

TAS will be conducting NAPLAN Online readiness tests during week 9. Please see below to find details of specific days allocated to your child's year group. **Your child** is required to bring a set of headphones (earbuds or ear phones) to the test.

Fact sheet for parents and carers

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual national assessment for students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. Planning has begun to move NAPLAN from a pen and paper assessment to an online assessment.

What are the benefits of NAPLAN Online?

Results will be faster and more precise

- Your child's individual results will be returned to you within just a few weeks of the NAPLAN testing.
- Online assessment will reduce the time it takes to mark and provide feedback to schools, teachers and parents.
- Improved precision and timing of results will help teachers to tailor their teaching more specifically to address students' learning needs.

Tailored tests will provide better assessment

- The online format allows for 'tailored testing', where the test adapts to a student's performance and asks questions that match their achievement level.
- Students in each year level start with the same set of questions which can then branch into a different set of questions based on their responses to the first set of questions.
- This means that students will be directed to questions that may be easier or more challenging depending on their responses.
- This test design will allow students to better demonstrate their literacy and numeracy skills.
- Students find online assessment is more engaging*, which means they are encouraged to persist longer and try harder.
- * Research by the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) into online assessment has shown that students have engaged well with electronic tests.

NAPLAN Online School Readiness Test

NSW schools will participate in a school readiness test between 14 August and 22 September 2017.

The school readiness test is a 'practice run' for schools to assess their technology ahead of NAPLAN Online. The readiness test is not an assessment of student ability. The readiness test allows schools to:

- become familiar with the NAPLAN Online test format and processes
- check whether they have the technical capacity, rooms and devices to administer NAPLAN Online
- provide students in NAPLAN years 3, 5, 7 and 9 with the opportunity to experience the online test question types and format by completing a practice NAPLAN online test.


Exchange Students

I am pleased to announce the plans for the 2018 Japan Study Tour. The trip is a combined Japanese/HSIE Study Tour and will involve a three day stay in China before travelling around Japan for 10 days.

Students currently studying Japanese in Years 8, 9 and 10 are invited to participate on this Study Tour. It is estimated that 15 students will participate and at this stage the Study Tour will take place from Friday, 28 September to Friday, 12 October 2018. This trip will take place after the completion of next year's course 'Traveling in Japan' in Semester 1 for Year 9/10 students.

The Study Tour will allow the students to use their language skills in an authentic environment and experience the history, culture and lifestyle of two fascinating Asian countries. Living Lessons: French/HSIE Study Tour 2018

The study tour is open to current French/HSIE students in Years 8, 9 and 10 interested in enhancing their understanding of French culture, history and language in 2018.

The study tour will complement topics studied within the Stage 5 Year 9/10 electives Travelling in France and Living in France and the Stage 6 French Continuers course, together with topics studied in both Stage 5 and 6 History curriculums.

The study tour will include a homestay experience and students will travel by métro in Paris and by TGV, the high-speed train, as they explore beyond the capital. The tour will also include a two-day visit to the Somme battlefields of World War I and day trips to Geneva (Switzerland) and Monte Carlo (Monaco) by rail.

The estimated base cost is \$3500 for the 12-day study tour, understanding that currency changes over the next 12 months may change. This figure does not include food, entrance to some museums and sights, or spending money. A more accurate figure will be determined at a later date.

The value of the 'seconds'

Did you know history was made last week at TAS? What, you didn't know? In all honesty I didn't realise it either, but its significance hit me last Monday.

Girls have been a part of Senior and Middle School at TAS for over 18 months. I have been watching with great pride as we as community do what all strong and vibrant communities do, evolve. New initiatives come like IDEALS Week, and working teams to strategise over literacy and numeracy implications in light of the government benchmarks that have been set. Groups such as the service learning team are established to take 'service' in the school to the next level. New subjects in our elective program are offered and curricular endeavours pop up. I could go on, but all I'm highlighting is that TAS is not a school that rests on its laurels. This attitude inevitably comes with lots of 'firsts' and it's one of the main reasons I crossed the country to work at TAS. I like being part of building something and I am buzzed by the 'firsts' because when you focus on creating/ planning/ setting up 'firsts' there's possibility and potential and its incredibly 'freeing'!

Last Monday, I sent a text out to the boarding girls requesting that they be at our evening meeting by 6.30pm (10 minutes earlier than usual), to hear from the Year 11s wanting to be the next Girls Boarding Captain and Deputy. I got to the common room by 6.25 and what I saw was a roomful of girls showing respect for a process and support for those coming through who were brave enough to put their hands up and say 'I want to be your leader'. I listened as my 'first' boarding captains spoke about the need to elect someone who cares and who will come alongside and the pride they feel in



being leaders of this incredible group of young women. I listened as Year 11 girls talked about leaving legacy and how they wanted to 'be there' for the house. Talk is cheap, as we know, but both the present and future leaders all spoke with conviction and a real understanding of what we expect of a TAS leader, a TAS leader of the Girls Boarding House.

I feel like I've been living in the midst of 'firsts' for 18 months. So much of what I have been involved with has been new, each step has been about creating and building foundation - the 'firsts' of things. So why was history made on a fairly average Monday night in girls boarding last week? Well it wasn't just because I had all my Year 8-12 cherubs, 37 of them, early for a meeting! As I listened to the girls and looked around the room at my ever growing boarding house, I felt a new kind of jolt... not the euphoria of 'first', but the pride of the 'second.' I suddenly realised that my boarding house was heading into a 'second' life cycle. We have had our 'first' leaders and now we are about to have our 'second' and with that comes a different set of opportunities.

On a larger scale I believe the girls boarding house reflects the co-ed journey of the school. I realise we have been doing 'seconds' for a while, and upon reflection I have probably been so preoccupied with the last of the 'firsts' to realise the true significance of these seconds. So, I'd like to raise a metaphorical toast, in honour of the 'seconds', you know what and who you are... The firsts have been incredible, but because you, all the seconds, we can now say that The Armidale School really is 'developing and growing' as a co-education school.

Public Speaking

Despite facing an extra challenge of having to project their voices in the gym without amplification (due to technical issues), the thought-provoking speeches, of their own choice, were heard and digested by an engaged audience of students from Years 6-12, and staff.

Henry O'Neil (Green House) got the competition off to a fine start with a reflection on what is success, outlining the difference between resume virtures and eulogy virtues, and echoed Einstein's notion that it is better to be a person of value, than of 'success'.

Owen Chandler (Ross) exploded out of the blocks and after reassuring everyone he was not going to speak about Communism – a personal fascination – explored the notion of traditions and change with great confidence and delivery.

The current debate about same sex marriage was the topic chosen by both Flynn Ihle (Croft) and Dan Lethbridge (Tyrrell) who similarly arced their advocacy for the 'yes' case in the upcoming plebiscite. Humour was the order of the day for Nicholas Bohlsen, whose comedic advice on how to be a cool nerd included the suggestion to always hang out with people even more uncool than you are.

Summer sports choices

Most children have returned their summer sports choices for Term 4. If you have not returned your form to your class teacher, please do so promptly as we are trying to finalise teams and groups this week.

General Information about Summer Sports (available to Junior School students for Summer 2017/2018)

Junior School students will be choosing their summer sport this week. With this in mind, a description of the various options appears below.

Junior School Policy re Participation in Sport All students in Year 3 and above will participate in one summer sport in Terms 4 and Term 1, 2018. Students in Year 2 and below do not have to participate but are encouraged to do so. If students in Year 2 or below do participate they will commit to the sport (including training sessions) for the duration of that season. Training times and sessions vary depending on the chosen sport.

Description of Sports available:

Cricket:

To make cricket enjoyable and fun, different age groups play according to different rules. All games are played on Saturday mornings. Registration and insurance fees apply. See separate cricket groups for costings.

The different competitions are:

Milo In 2 Cricket/'Kanga' for U6s:

'Milo In 2 Cricket' (skills development) will be conducted up until Christmas. This will be played on TAS Cricket Oval between 9:15am and 10:15am. It will mainly be for 5 and 6 year olds with the option of 7 year olds playing if they wish. Term 4 is usually working on skills and Term 1, 2018 will be starting games. Kanga Cricket is played between two teams on two adjacent 'fields' (still on TAS Cricket Oval) so that both innings go on at the same time. Games start at 9:00am and finish around 10:30am.

Teams consist of 12 players (24 over game). At any one time, there should be 2 batting on Field 1, 8 fielding on Field 2 and 2 preparing to bat. Players bat in pairs for 4 overs. Children turning 7 and 8 years of age are encouraged to play U9s cricket, rather than Kanga, if they have the desire and ability. Cost will be approx. \$86 for the season.

'Average Cricket' for U9s:

(players must be under 9 on 1st September 2017) Teams consist of 8 players per side. Games start at 9:00am and finish by 11:10am (2 hour games). Each team faces 16 overs. The team's score is determined by dividing the number of runs scored by the number of wickets lost, plus one. The higher average score wins the match. Each player must bowl 2 overs. Cost will be approx. \$86 for the season.

'One-day matches' for U11s:

(players must be under 10 or under 11 on 1st September 2017) Teams consist of 11 players per side. Games start at 9:00am and finish by 12:10pm. The first innings is limited to 25 six-ball overs per team. No more than 50 overs shall be bowled in a match. Each player must bowl a minimum of 2 overs with a maximum of 3 overs. A batsman must retire when his score reaches 20. Cost will be approx. \$97 for the season.

'Two-day matches' for 12s:

(players must be under 12 on 1st September 2017) Teams consist of 11 players per side. Games start at 9:00am and finish by 12:10pm. A team's innings consists of 50 overs, with each team batting and bowling for 25 overs on each of the two days. Each player must bowl a minimum of 1 over with a maximum of 4 overs. A batsman must retire when his score reaches 50. Trainings will be Monday and Wednesdays. Cost will be approx. \$97 for the season.

Swimming: (This is not for beginners)

In choosing this sport, children should be able to competently swim at least two laps of the TAS pool (preferably in all 4 strokes). (Parents wanting 'Learn to Swim' lessons for their children are encouraged to contact the TAS Sports Centre on 6776 5866, to arrange lessons). All swimmers will train in the TAS pool on Thursdays from 3:45pm to 4:45pm. The instructor concentrates on stroke correction and improving fitness. Additionally, students are expected to join the TAS based 'Alligators Swim Club' (approx. \$75 for the season) which holds Club nights every Friday night at the TAS pool from 6:30pm to 7:30pm. These are not only good opportunities to improve fitness and speed but are good social occasions as well. Costs will be \$10 per week and the Alligators membership.

Gymnastics: K-3

Held at the Armidale Gymnasium. The sessions will be on Mondays from 3:50 – 4:50pm run by qualified Level 1 coaches provided by Armidale Gymnastics Club. The cost is approximately \$190 for the season (Term 4 and Term 1, 2018). Children will travel by TAS minibus to and from the gym with staff members supervising all sessions and travel.

Tennis: Years K-5

Hot Shots Tennis program

Students will participate in the MLC Tennis Hot Shots, led by Justin Sheriff. There will be 2 levels of the program offered. 'Hot Shots Red Ball' will be for beginners, and suited to students aged 5-8. (T-Yr 2) This will be held on Monday afternoons from 4:00pm - 4.45pm. Students in the Red stage play on a smaller court, use a larger ball, which doesn't bounce as high.

Students in Years 3 and above will participate in '3-5 Red and Orange Ball'. Training will also be held on Monday afternoons from 4:00pm - 4.45pm. The Orange stage of the program is also on a reduced court size and the ball has less compression.

These small group lessons are for 4 players @ \$128 for 8 weeks. Each small group will have their own tennis coach for these sessions.

Ball Skills: Transition – Year 2

This training session is for T-2 only and will be based around the ball skills required for games such as tennis, cricket, basketball and netball. Children will participate in the Monday afternoon training session at TAS.

Basketball: Years 3-5

It is anticipated that Armidale Basketball Association will run two competitions: one for combined Yr 5/6 teams and one for combined Yr 3/4 teams. 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
