Extended Academic Day Progress

As I hope all parents now know, the opportunity is now available for all students to take advantage of extended library opening hours in the morning and evening as well as focussed academic presentations, tutoring and evening meals for day students. The data now in for the month of February shows that this new offering has been hugely popular and that is very encouraging. In just 16 days (Monday to Thursday), over 500 students signed in for evening sessions, meaning that on average more than 30 students have elected to use this facility for their study each day.

Quite appropriately nearly half of these were students from Year 12 and two thirds from Year 11 and 12, but the numbers from Years 9 and 10 have been encouraging too. It is also pleasing to see that there have been equal numbers of day and boarding students.

Feedback from those students who have been using the extended academic day has highlighted the usefulness of the Monday academic presentations thus far and the popularity of studying together. Facilitating collaboration, especially for our senior students, is a key reason for creating this offering and it is clearly being taken advantage of well.

I hope that this will serve as encouragement to other senior students to join those who are showing such good purpose in their study program in this early part of the year. Finding the motivation and focus to study well in the evening after a full and often tiring day at school can be a real challenge and this group environment offers real assistance in meeting that.

Virtual Debating Competition



Particular thanks are due to our debating coordinator, Tim Hughes, for his initiative in bringing the virtual competition to TAS and for his mentoring and coaching that is clearly having an impact.

Many believe that with God comes guilt, burden, a stifled existence, a lack of reason, intelligence left at the door and a lack of autonomy.



CO-CURRICULAR REPORTS

2018 NSW Country Swimming Championships

The weekend of 23-25 February saw the annual NSW Country Swimming Championships held at Sydney Olympic Park. This meet is not simply open to anyone, as the athletes must attain qualifying times in order to compete. This requires great dedication to training, almost inevitably early mornings whilst everyone else sleeps. Lucy Fenwicke, Jesse Streeting, Toby Michell-Smith and Iles Baker, on the back thousands of laps during training, made the trip to Sydney, some chasing PB's, other National qualifiers.

Lucy was outstanding, winning the 16 years 200m breastroke, 2nd in the 100m and 3rd in the 50m. In the 100m and 200m, Lucy achieved her goal of National times.

Jesse placed 2nd in the 17 years 50m freestyle, 3rd in the 100m backstroke and was 4th in both the 100m freestyle and 100m butterfly. Jesse scored three National times in the 50m and 100m freestyle and the 100m butterfly.

Toby raced the full deck across the three days of competition. He placed 3rd in the 12yrs medley relay, 4th in the 400m freestyle, 5th in the 200m freestyle, 6th in the 100m breastroke, 6th in the 100m freestyle, 7th in the freestyle relay, 9th in the 100m butterfly and 12th in the 200m breastroke.

Iles Baker, the youngest TAS competitor, raced in his pet event, the 100m
Breaststroke. With great determination he placed a resolute 15th.

NSW All Schools Triathlon

The annual NSW All Schools Triathlon was held last Wednesday at the outstanding Penrith Regatta Centre. Home to the Sydney Olympics for Rowing, the venue is perfectly suited to the fast and exciting sport of Triathlon.

A strong TAS contingent arrived keen and well prepared for the State Titles. Racing against numerous students in the National Talent ID program, the competition is always of the highest standards, however many of the students have been training exceptionally well over the past few months.

A deep-water start is always a challenge, the flurry of arms and legs in a tight space can unsettle many. For Sam King, Hamish Cannington, Hamish Tydd and Emma Ward this is just par for the course as the commenced their 750m swim amongst 97 fellow competitors. Hamish exited the swim in 17th place, a huge result. After a quick transition, it was onto the bike course with four laps of the 5km circuit awaiting their attack. Sam hammered throughout the ride, moving through the field, whilst Emma held her own within some fantastic competition. Onto the 5km run and Sam continued his charge, striding out to a wonderful 18th place. Not far behind was Hamish Cannington, whose solid performance across all three legs resulted in a 24th place finish. Hamish Tydd had easily his best ever Championships, with an outstanding run taking him through the field to finish 35th. Amongst the women, Emma showed great tenacity to cross the line in 21st overall.

The intermediate distance was 600/15/4 and again the deep-water start set the tone for the race. James O'Brien flashed through the water and was onto the bike in the blink of an eye. Sam Jones, off the back of some great recent performances, had a solid swim and then unleashed on the ride. Lucas Cotterell and Clancy Roberts showed their swimming skills with a great aquatic performance and they then followed this with a strong ride. Albertus Hattingh and Katie Allen, worked their way through the swim and once onto dry land, their confidence soared, as did their speed. Sam was pinged with a drafting call, resulting in a 3m time penalty and his dream of a top 10 finish over. He did not let that end his race, rather Sam held strong and raced across the line in 33rd position. Not far behind was James O'Brien, whose summer training paid off handsomely with a 35th finish. Lucas, always a powerhouse on the run placed 91st, Clancy with an enormous Pb 100th, Albertus 115th and Katie, in her first major race, was a great 76th.





Algernon Henry Belfield's Weather Records: a community seminar

One of the early Board Directors of TAS whose family has a long history with the School, Algernon Henry Belfield (1838-1922) was a pastoralist, a citizen astronomer and meteorologist. In this latter role, he recorded in meticulous detail his weather observations for over 45 years at his Eversleigh Station in the New England district. His weather diaries have been digitised and are now available for future climate research.

On 12 March, from 9.30am to 12 noon at Saumarez Homestead, Bill Oates (UNE), Dr Linden Ashcroft (Bureau of Meteorology), Ass. Professor Howard Bridgman (Newcastle Uni), and Dr Ken Thornton (Newcastle Uni) will present an update on Belfield's personal history, the digitization of his handwritten records, and their significance to research into the weather and climate both in the New England and on a global stage.
