TAS Experience Days for Future Students

Monday of this week saw the beginnings of changes to the way that we introduce prospective students to the School through our 'experience visits'. As many families will know through their own experience, in recent years we have made individual arrangements for each family and these have been spread right through the year. In order to cater for the increased numbers of new enrolments and make processes for our enrolments team more efficient and effective, we are offering nine designated Experience Days through 2018, spread from May to October. As always, all prospective students are being invited to take advantage of the opportunity to have a day in class with their age cohort and for those entering Middle School as boarders this is a chance to stay overnight and get a feel for the boarding experience as well.

Monday, was the first of these days, with five students spending the time in Year 6. From all reports the beginnings of this new system worked very well indeed and I offer thanks to the Enrolments Office and Year 6 teachers Kirsty Brunsdon and Gill Downes along with the Year 6 buddies in their classes for welcoming these students.

The Enrolments Office is taking bookings for future days and we expect that a large proportion of new enrolments for next year will take advantage of this opportunity.

Eisteddfod Progress

The Armidale Eisteddfod has moved into its second week and already a large number of our students have had wonderful experiences being a part of it. I mentioned the excellent Choirs Night in TAS Talks last week and since then the music events have moved through composition and vocal performance. Particular congratulations are due to Toby Bauer who excelled in a field of over 70 entrants to win the Elena Kats-Chernin Prize for best overall composition, Jasper O'Neil who, for the third consecutive year won The Huddleston Family Perpetual Shield for the New England Vocal Age Championship for 12 years and under and Year 4 student Mila Downes who took second place in the same event.

In exciting news, Sarskia Clark, Samantha Crossle, Hannah Quilty and Lydie Taylor took out first place at the New England Dance Eisteddfod. This is the first time that TAS has entered the NEDE and I hope that the girls, along with their dance coach Jane Chivers, are feeling appropriately proud of their efforts.

The Eisteddfod continues, with brass and mixed instruments performing now and five days of string events beginning tomorrow, including performances from TAS Camerata, the Senior String Quartet and the TAS Piano Trio who will perform on Sunday. Bands and ensembles begin next week. I wish well to all our performers and their teachers for a happy and successful Eisteddfod.

Thanks to Cranbrook School

Last weekend Cranbrook School travelled to TAS to reignite a rugby tradition between our schools that has a strong history (I remember travelling with Cranbrook teams to TAS in the 1980s and 1990s) and I offer them thanks for making the effort to come to us en masse. The travel begins next weekend with another fresh addition to the season as we play St Gregory's College at Campbelltown and I wish all involved well for their travel and games.




This is a truly amazing love story. This is our story.

NCIS Cross Country Ballina

The annual journey to Ballina for Cross Country continued last Friday for NCIS. A strong team of 32 runners, across the three spheres of TAS made the trip, keen and ready to run!

This is a terrific event, which allows for representative athletes from all schools, Year 2 and above. First cab off the rank was Sam Marshall in the 18s, covering a 6km course. Racing sensibly Sam strode out over the final 3km lap to finish an impressive 3rd overall. In the 16s, Sam Jones ran at the front throughout the race to finish a solid 2nd, with Yann Garrivet in 4th, John Moore 6th, Patrick Brennan 18th and Clancy Roberts in 21st. For the ladies, Katie Allen continued her great run of form, crossing the line also in 6th place. In the 15 years Albertus Hattingh was consistent across his 4km journey, placing 17th. In the 14 years, Mac Orr raced to a terrific 5th place, Hudson Eichorn 17th and Oliver Ledingham to 20th spot. HEAD OF MIDDLE SCHOOL

School Life

Last weekend it was Cranbrook at TAS. By lunchtime on Friday, this place could suit the schoolyard scene from Cormac McCarthy's amazingly, indeed, grippingly graphic novel, *The Road*. After a busy 'feed and water' station atmosphere in the Dining Hall students will pile into coaches to spend the better part of Saturday in Sydney. Within minutes, the only things left at school will be fewer students and greater silence really. No ash though, thank goodness (a further reference to McCarthy's award winner). These kinds of weekend activity are, again, a great recommendation of the School. Please encourage your children to make the best of all things that come their way.

Indeed, as part of their Middle Schoool experience, I want your children to 'take the initiative' in a much broader sense during their time in Middle School. As indicated in past TAS Talks inclusions, I am happy about the prospect of working with all people for whom I'm directly responsible. Something that should make our time together universally worthwhile is a work place that encourages the collaborative efforts of students and staff. The only realistic and sensible way to ensure such an atmosphere is to invite their comments in a place that encourages the level of confidence necessary for each girl and boy to be resourceful and to have a 'voice'. Specifically, your brief is to encourage your children to 'speak out' in a respectful manner: ours is to ensure that the level of respect is 'followed through' and reciprocated. Yes, I know that this style of environment is the ideal and am acutely aware that we're dealing with young adolescents for whom school life, in particular, can be characteristically challenging, indeed, daunting. I also know that if we don't continue to try to effect such an environment here in Middle School, then we're not doing the right thing by these young people as it's our collective brief, as parents and teachers, to ensure that they're happy and, as such, resilient enough to meet the greater challenges, independence and responsibilities of Senior School life.

As you know, exams are looming and they can be challenging. Over the past week I have been speaking to students across the year groups, encouraging them to ask for advice, seek clarification and to be sure about expectations. From today's Staff Meeting I also know that some staff have been in contact with you about exams. Such communication is good as our vested interests are in the same people - our students are your children. At this week's Town Meeting I advised all people that we want to know how they're 'faring' in relation to curriculum demands. In short, I want them simply to try hard and to perform as well as they can perform.

Ah, and by the way – if you appreciate the crisp clarity and brilliance of a beautiful autumn day such as those we're experiencing in Armidale (we've been treated to loads of these over the last few weeks, actually) and, if you're in the mood for appreciation of opposites, you might look at McCarthy's novel one day. But, I warn you, it's definitely confronting.

I hope your week is a good one and that it's raining – somewhere.




JUNIOR SCHOOL SPORT
