#### City to Surf

The spirit of our community was in full public view last Sunday as TAS fielded a record team in what is now the biggest fun run in the world. Our team of 272, including over 200 students, was by far and away the largest school presence in this massive event and it attracted a lot of comment all along the way. It also generated its own buzz amongst our runners and the mood and keenness from every runner to push themselves and do their best was impressive.

Every runner deserves to be congratulated on finishing the event, but special accolades must go to Disa Smart whose time of just over 60 minutes placed her 9th woman from 1,134 runners in the 16 to 19 years category and to Sam Jones who set a TAS record time of 56:12 to come in 38th from 1,217 runners in the men's 16 to 19 bracket and Emerson Browning who was not far behind and placed 14th from 1,136 boys in the 13 to 15 years category.

Special congratulations must also go to Mr Pennington who again led the TAS charge and managed to inspire such a huge number of our students. Even with these numbers the event ran like a well-oiled machine for our contingent and that is a great credit to him.

### NOTICE BOARD

#### Motor vehicle regulations

With students in senior years striving to achieve their L or P licences, students and parents are reminded that no L or P plater drivers (whether they be students at TAS or another school) are permitted to drive a vehicle into the school grounds at any time, including the beginning and end of term when boarders are departing/arriving at school. This is outlined in the School Rules and Regulations that can be found on the website, in both the Parents and Students Portals.

A day student may drive to school provided he/she and their parents have provided the 'Permission to Drive to School' form in duplicate, available from Reception or the school website. Students are to park in Douglas St or Mann St only. The vehicle is not to be used between the commencement of the school day and 3.30 pm (unless permission has been sought for Late Arrival/Early Leave in the case of Year 12 students). The vehicle is not to be brought on to school property.

Students are forbidden to drive other students in their cars without the written permission of parents of the passenger, which should then be submitted to the Deputy Headmaster.

Boarders are not to have the use of a motor vehicle in Armidale unless parents have presented a case for good cause and the Deputy Headmaster has approved. A separate Boarders Drivers form is available from Reception and the website.

I was very pleased with the way the Abbott boys embraced the advice and engaged with the material and those I spoke with afterwards found some useful, practical tips that they can use in their preparation for assessments. While examinations might seem like a long way off for Year 9 and 10, the focus of the session is to develop good habits that will help each student achieve academic success. Croft House will have their session Tuesday night, Tyrrell Wednesday evening and Girls on Thursday night. Middle School will have a modified session later this term

Essentially, through the study skills sessions, I am encouraging boarders to strike a good balance between co-curricular, social and academic pursuits and providing them with some practical tools to help them learn material. The main takeaway is that to learn information we need to engage with it. Simply reading is not enough. To really commit information to memory we need to organise and/or transform it. Hopefully we will start to see notebooks being filled with summaries, flow charts and diagrams.

While we recognise academic success will look different for each boarder, it is our firm belief that every student should be aiming for personal excellence. In order to achieve their best, they need to prioritise academic work and do it to the best of their ability. Boarding truly can be an academic advantage if boarders make the most of the opportunities presented to them.

Scheduled prep time is an obvious advantage but living in close proximity to other people studying the same courses makes collaborative learning a lot easier. The extended day opens up opportunities for day students to receive the same benefit but it is so much more convenient for boarders, many of whom are already taking advantage of the chance to complete group work or consult subject specialists for individual help.

I would strongly encourage any boarders who are experiencing academic challenges to reach out and seek assistance. They are, after all, surrounded by staff who want to see them do well.

#### **Australian History Competition**


Many congratulations to History student Thomas Wu, who has achieved the incredible feat of being the Year 10 Australian History national and NSW state champion for 2018. Thomas achieved an extraordinary mark of 100 per cent in this year's competition, which really is an amazing accomplishment given the complexity of the test. One of the more challenging aspects of the competition is that students are required to analyse unseen sources, and in order for Thomas to do well in this part of the paper he would have had to draw on all of the skills that he has learned in History classes over the last few years. Thomas has received a medallion for being the state champion, a leather-bound certificate for being the national champion, and also a monetary prize of \$250. It is wonderful to see that our History students continue to perform so capably in this national competition, as this result builds on the success of Thomas Price in 2017, who was the NSW state champion. It might be difficult to improve further from here, but there are some very capable students in Year 9, so we look forward to watching their progress.

### CO-CURRICULAR REPORTS

#### TAS a might force in City to Surf

A top ten result for the first girl home and a new record for the fastest TAS student were highlights of Sunday's City to Surf fun run for the 272 strong team from The Armidale School.

The largest school team in the world's largest fun run by a country mile, the northern students certainly made their presence felt along the 14km route.

First home for TAS was Samuel Jones in 56:12, knocking more than 30 seconds off the previous record for a TAS runner and improving his time of last year by more than four minutes. Maintaining an average pace of four minutes for each of the 14km and finishing in the top one per cent, Samuel, in Year 10, was 38th of 1, 217 in the male 16-19 category, and 671st overall of more than 67,000 finishers.

Not far behind was Emerson Browning in 57:33, 14th home of the 1,136 males aged 13-15 years.

In a stunning race, Disa Smart, the first girl finisher for TAS in 1:00:35, was ninth of 1,134 girls in the female 16-19 category, an improvement of three places from last year. The bulk of the TAS team finished inside 1:45:00, a sterling effort by all.

However it wasn't just the fast runners that were the star performers, but all students, staff and parents who put their hands up to be part of the event. The sense of school spirit and community pride was evident from the time the four coaches left Armidale, until they returned. If there was any doubt what how engaged our students are in something bigger than themselves was the way that, despite sore muscles and aching limbs, they so enthusiastically danced along to the tunes played by Sincopa Trio where the school's base was, encouraging hundreds of other racegoers as they headed towards the finish line.

An event involving so many students can only run smoothly with the support and assistance of a large number of staff, and I am most grateful to them for coming on board this year. Despite having almost 100 more students running in 2018, we were on the buses home an hour earlier than last year.

While many runners took part in the event as part of their pursuit of the Triple Crown, it mustn't be forgotten that everyone ran with Batyr on their singlet, a #doitfordolly cattle tag, and a willingness to continue talking about the issue of mental health.


