Vale Ian Kiernan

Most readers will have already heard that Old Armidalian (1952-1958) and great Australian Ian Kiernan AO died last night at the age of 78 after a battle with cancer this year. Ian will be best remembered for his pioneering work for the environment in establishing the 'Clean Up Sydney Harbour', 'Clean Up Australia' and 'Clean Up the World' campaigns. These hugely successful campaigns had their origins in Ian's experience whilst competing in a round the world yacht race in 1982 and he was recognized for them in being named Australian of the Year in 1994.

Ian remained a great friend and supporter of the School through his lifetime, joining us as our guest speaker at Speech Day in 2011, keynote speaker at our Round Square conference in 2012 and as a Foundation Member of the TAS Company through to his death today. Ian has already contributed a great deal to his old school and it is our hope that we will be able to continue to build on the legacy of his inspired work for the environment.

As the tributes for Ian flow in, our thoughts and prayers go out to his wife Judy and his children.

BUS TRAVEL INFORMATION FOR DAY STUDENTS ONLY

Application process for the 2019 school year is open from Monday, 15 October 2018.

Students progressing to Year 3 and Year 7 do not need to re-apply if they:

- are continuing at the same school
- are residing at the same address
- have not been sent an expiry notification from Transport for NSW.

Where a student meets the new distance eligibility, the system will automatically update their entitlement. If they do not meet the new eligibility, they will receive an expiry notification.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition which is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply. If students need to update their information or re-apply, they should go online to <https://apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts/updateDetails>

Applications need to be submitted before 31 December 2018 to ensure student entitlements are updated and their current entitlement/card is not cancelled. If their application is submitted after 31 December 2018, the system will automatically cancel a card and a new one will need to be issued.

For day students residing within the Armidale township boundary, cards will be mailed to the home address during December 2018 and January 2019.

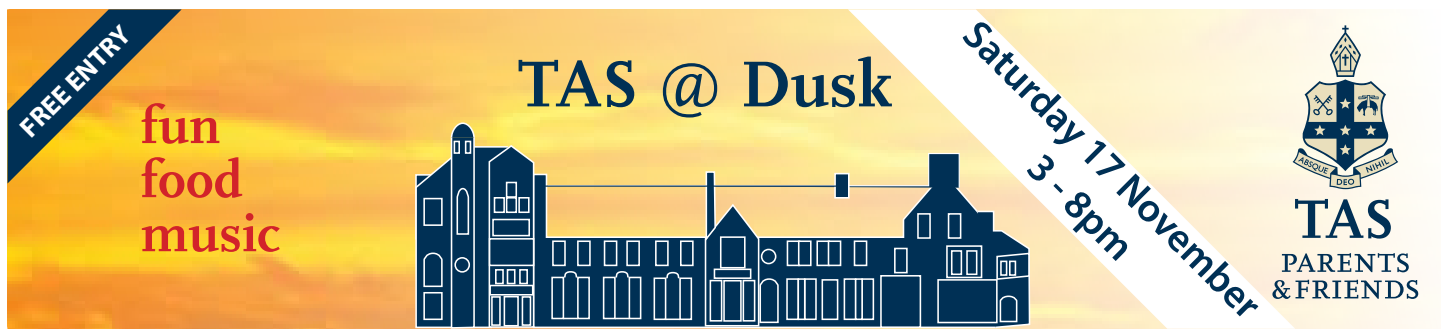
Armidale outside town boundary/Uralla/Guyra/Walcha Rural and Regional (R&R) operators do not issue hard copy travel passes.

Seemed like a good idea at the time

Liam Treavors, a.k.a: Treav - Thailand 2018, Seemed like a good idea at the time.

One morning rather than eating the familiar food of cereal, milk and yoghurt I thought we should go to a little market we discovered while living in Chiang Mai last year. This is a fantastic experience, the only people there are locals from the district where the market is situated. We were, as expected, the only Westerners in the market.

Now, a couple of days earlier a game had been established that if someone bought you food, you were obligated to eat it, so larvae etc. had been consumed (mind you, you didn't have to play - I didn't!)

There were foods here that could be consumed without fear such as delicious sweet sticky rice and banana wrapped in banana leaves, fried eggs and pork or fruit.

However, when Mr Patrick purchased a toad held splayed by a bamboo stretcher, Treav found himself obligated. Without hesitation he bit decisively into the thigh of the disgusting creature come culinary creation. Then the cry rang out through the market in broken English "no ooo, you cook". Not only did Treav eat a dodgy toad, it was raw, and even to the locals this was not a good idea. Later that day it became evident to Treav what seemed like a good idea at the time was in fact a very bad idea. I think the only thing that looked worse than that toad was Treav's skin colour.

Perhaps what we have seen in Treav is a little glimpse of what love looks like...

Love bears all things, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.

You see Treav was happy to bear the toad for the sake of any others who might have been tempted to eat that disgusting amphibian; he trusted Mr Patrick; he hoped that the toad would be OK to eat, in other words he had a positive future outlook and he persevered as his teeth penetrated the gnarly toadskin.

But is this enough, is this enough for us to say oh yes, that's what I must do, that's what I will do? As much as I think Treav is tops, his example is not enough. What is enough? Who is enough?

Christ is enough!

To understand this sentence these four phrases are better understood together rather than as separate ideas.

Together they help us to see that the love being spoken of here is an utter enemy to selfishness; it does not desire or seek its own praise, or honour, or profit, or pleasure. Love never seeks its own good at the expense or to neglect of others. It always prefers the welfare of others to its private advantage.

Love is not disposed to revenge.

Of course we see this best demonstrated in the person of Christ, when he took the load for us. He did not quickly seek to condemn us, or expose us, or publicly ridicule or judge us. He sort to redeem us. Jesus is the prime example that we follow, but this is what Treav does, he follows the saviour who loves him despite his failings. And wants us to do the same.

TAS STEM TRIP

In this trip to West Coast USA (Seattle, San Francisco and Los Angeles) students will visit major industry leaders such as Boeing, NASA, and Microsoft and meet with people working on the frontiers of Science, Technology, Engineering & Mathematics.

There will be plenty of 'hands on' experiences at places such as the California Academy of Sciences, Tech Museum of Innovation, La Brea Tar Pits, Intel Museum and opportunities to develop critical thinking, problem solving and teamwork during a simulated space mission at the Chabot Space & Science Centre. The trip also includes a visit to the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and students will do some service learning prior to the trip to look at, and contribute towards, their work of reducing inequity. A visit to the University of California Berkley Campus and a start-up business 'accelerator' should inspire students to aim high in their future careers.

This trip is open to all students in Years 9-12 in 2019. Please see attached for further details about the itinerary.

Costs will be dependent on student numbers and there may be some minor variations to the itinerary but currently the costs are:

These costs include:

- International return airfares and internal US domestic airfares including all prepaid airlines taxes, surcharges and levies
- 9 nights of accommodation based on students sharing twin rooms & teachers in single rooms. A single supplement will apply in case of uneven student numbers or gender numbers
- Transport by coach as per the itinerary
- Breakfast daily, 9 x dinners
- Sightseeing and entry to attractions as noted in the itinerary.

Additional costs:

- Travel Insurance – this can be organised through Horizons Travel but will be done by individuals. The cost can vary depending on level of cover chosen. Some parents may wish to purchase travel insurance from another source. Expected additional cost for mid-international coverage is @ \$180
- Lunches and incidental evening costs – students should have approx US\$150 in spending money to cover these costs
- Visa costs (if required)
- Travel to and from Sydney. As this trip starts and finishes during the holidays domestic travel is not included. All costs are EX Sydney.

By keeping a journal of their trip along the way, students will be putting a magnifying glass on everyday aspects of French language and culture, noting new vocabulary, expressions and cultural and historical aspects learned. Language skills will be extended by challenging their knowledge and courage to use French as much as possible in speaking, reading, listening and writing in French. From the Louvre and Eiffel Tower to the Mont St Michel and Monet’s garden at Giverny, students will be absorbing France, it’s language and culture by engaging in everyday activities such as buying food and drink, eating at restaurants and cafés, purchasing souvenirs and visiting famous monuments in the City of Light, the Loire Valley and Brittany. They will appreciate the architecture and layout of Paris, interact with French people, experience café culture, get their portrait painted if they wish and explore the historical *quartiers* of Paris. French students will spend two nights with a French host family, giving them an opportunity to experience family life in France, eating dinner and putting their language skills into action. A challenging and exciting prospect! This immersion experience will improve students’ language skills considerably, as well as providing them with greater cultural knowledge of life in a French family. Family and Daily Life are both topics studied in Stages 5 and 6 French.

This type of real-world engagement aims to energise and motivate students’ passion for language learning, enhancing enjoyment and appreciation of the language through first-hand, authentic experiences which will have long lasting benefits for all those who participate.

NSW All Schools Athletics

As the term wound down for most of us in September, things went stratospheric for Eliza Ward, April Draney, Isaac Gerdes and Sam Jones as they contested the NSW All Schools Athletics Championships. Competing with the best on offer in the State, they all performed with aplomb. For Eliza it was the return to competition after more than six months off with injury. In the 15 years High Jump, Eliza equalled her PB with a leap of 1.60m into 4th place. She then followed this with an outstanding heat run in the 800m, putting her into the finals. In a very fast race, Eliza held her form to finish 9th in NSW. April Draney was next up, contesting the 15 years Shot Put. In her first State Championships April best throw of 9.66m gave her a final place of 13th overall. Isaac Gerdes went all out, competing in the 14 years 100/200 and Long Jump. He finished 17th in the Long Jump, 22nd in the 200m and 32nd in the 100m into a massive headwind. Sam Jones rounded out the group with a sensational race in the 16 years 2000m Steeplechase. Sticking with the lead group all the way, Sam hammered the final 200m to finish a wonderful 2nd, and in doing so, a place in the NSW team for the Australian Schools Championships in December.

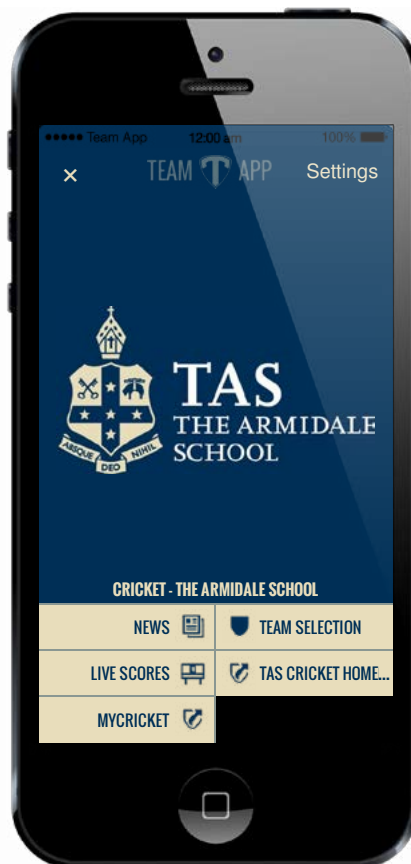
