I write this week from the field where I have the opportunity to see our Middle and Senior School students challenging themselves at surf lifesaving and in their cadet activities. Tri-Schools Debating for Middle School

The debating year for our keen Middle School students concluded last week with the final round of the Tri-Schools debating competition hosted at NEGS and there was great excitement for our three teams who won all of their debates on the day to take out the 2018 competition with success in nine of the 12 debates through the season. This is the first year that TAS has taken the title in the nine year history of this great inter-schools competition between NEGS, PLC and TAS and it highlights how far debating has come at TAS through this time. Debating is something of a mélange of art and science and the only way to improve in it is to deliberately learn its principles, intricacies and subtleties. That learning process has been led by Tim Hughes at TAS and I congratulate him as much as our student teams on the development of the 'sport' over recent years. I hope that this success will inspire more students to test their intellectual depth and ability to argue and influence when the 2019 season gets underway.

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Cricket Success Continues

Last week I offered praise to our senior cricket team on their success in both the Armidale Second Grade competition and in reaching the guarter final of the Douglas Shield inter-schools knock-out 50 over competition. The team has carried on in the same vein since then, with another good win over Guyra last weekend and success in a rain affected game against St Philip's Christian College from Cessnock. The First XI will go on to play their semifinal in the Douglas Shield against an as yet unknown opposition early in Term 1, but there will be plenty of other cricket before then, both in Armidale and at the annual cricket festival in January, this year being played at St Ignatius College Riverview. Alice in Wonderland






CO-CURRICULAR REPORTS

The young St Philip's team made an impressive 135 runs in 50 overs, with TAS students Christen Taylor bowling 3/25, Hamish Cannington 2/26 and Andrew Kirk 2/31. Dahlia Glennie and Toby Smith were both not out, making 73 runs before more rain set in for the afternoon.

TAS won the game with the higher run rate on the day, which places them in the Semi Final against the winner of the game between St Luke's Grammar (Sydney) and Riverina Anglican College (Wagga Wagga). This semi final clash will happen next Term!

Middle School debaters win Tri-Schools Shield

Hearty congratulations to our Middle School debaters who on 28 November won all three of their debates in the final round of the Tri-Schools' Shield, kindly hosted by NEGS.

Arguing against the proposition 'That Australia should adopt a four day working week', the Year 6 team (Jack McCook, Lennox Neilson, Will Gilpin, Latifa Nedianu) said that either everyone would either have to work longer on four days if they wanted to get the same pay, or sacrifice one fifth of their salary to avoid bankrupting the nation.

The Year 7 team (Emily Buntine, Jasper O'Neil, Louis Ross, Wiley Wright) were the negative on the topic 'That Australia should implement a universal basic income', stating that there were more effective ways of providing financial assistance to those in need without giving everyone money even if they either didn't need it financially, were unable to manage it properly, or might be less motivated to find work as a result.

In a sophisticated debate, Year 8 (Frank Perrottet, Hugo Catterall, Will Jubb and Aiden Swick) affirmed 'That privacy should be a privilege, not a right', emphasising that in a post 9/11 world it was more important than ever that the rights of an individual were not absolute, and did not take precedence over the rights of society generally particularly in the area of national security. Over the course of the competition this year 23 TAS debaters won nine of 12 debates, and in doing so, took out the Tri-Schools' Shield for the first time since its inception in 2010. There's no doubt debating and public speaking is flourishing at TAS. Well done to all students who participated and worked to develop such important thinking and communication skills.
