This week we received news that Lily Neilson was named in the Australian Women's under 18 Indoor Hockey team, following the undefeated form of the NSW team at the national championships last month. The training schedule will be yet another commitment for Lily who is also a member of the NSW under 18's Women's field hockey side but I have no doubt she will rise to the challenge admirably. To be named in a national side is something achieved by so few, and I congratulate Lily on this wonderful recognition.

MR RICHARD NEWTON

"Famous Last Words" Luke 23:32-43

At 9 o'clock, 30 December, 2003, John Gregory Dunne experienced a massive coronary as he sat down to dinner with his wife in their New York apartment. His wife said in her book *The Year Of Magical Thinking*, "This is my attempt to make sense of the period that followed".

You see, we attach such great meaning to the dying words of people, in fact they have their own category – "famous last words". They are set apart and made more significant than words that may have been offered in the rest of life. Perhaps we hope to find a clue to what seems to be the hidden truths of life and death as a person crosses from one to the other.

Of course this isn't always the case, sometimes the last words aren't all that profound:"Die, the patient exclaimed, that's the last thing I'll do."

Oscar Wilde on his deathbed: "Either this wallpaper goes, or I do!"

James Rodges, murderer, on his final request before the firing squad, "Why yes -- a bulletproof vest."

What about one of the thieves hung next to Jesus at that most famous of deaths? He turns to Jesus and requests that he be remembered by Jesus. Is this a vein request, such as a bulletproof vest? Is it similar in that its just the cry of the desperate and perhaps any request is worth a go? As we read the accounts of Jesus' life and his words, he seems to have had an ability to see through to people's thoughts and motives beyond what was obvious. So perhaps Jesus reply will take us to the heart of the criminal's request. Jesus says, "today you will be with me in paradise."

Jesus takes the criminal seriously. This man's final words, his dying request rests on the mercy of Jesus. A man clearly, and to his own admission unworthy, receives the assurance from the eternal life giver himself, the assurance of paradise.

This man's dying words reveal that it is never too late to seek the forgiveness Jesus offers.

Perhaps "famous last words will teach us something of life and death."

PLEASE NOTE: The Library will close on Thursday 14 February at 5pm due to swimming events and War Cries being held at the TAS Pool. As with the early morning program, there is no cost for students accessing this support, nor do they need to book in.

Evening Program (3:30pm–7pm Mondays-Thursdays for Years 9-12)

The library will be open for all students in Years 9 to 12 to work quietly until 7pm. There is no subject specific academic support available during this time, however the library is supervised by Mrs Bremner and Mrs Polson who can give general guidance as required. Both day and boarding students are not required to book in to the library, nor will they be charged for this access.

Students are able to access dinner in the Dining Hall after 5:30pm and can do so by swiping their Student Card at the door. The cost associated with dinner (approx. \$6 per meal) will be added to their TAS account. Boarders are to sign out of their boarding house and return when required.

Evening Program (7-9pm on Mondays-Thursdays for Years 9-12)

The library is staffed by Mrs Susan Polson from 6 to 9pm. Mrs Polson is a trained teacher who is currently undertaking further studies in Special Education. In this time, Mrs Polson will be overseeing students working quietly in the library and assisting them with organising and completing their homework. She will give general guidance, assist in researching and referencing but is not providing specific tutoring in areas of concern. There is no cost for any senior student accessing this support nor do they need to book in. Boarders are to sign out of their boarding house and return when required.

EXTENDED DAY PROGRAM -LIBRARY

TAS will once again operate the schools Extended Day Program for those students who wish to use the Library at the start and/or end of the school day to complete homework, assessments or extra study and revision. The Library is supervised at all times during the extended opening hours.

Early Morning Program (7:30am–8:45am Monday-Friday for Years 6-12)

Students in Years 6 to 10 who are attending various commitments before school or who arrive at school early are now able to check into the library from 7:30am to work quietly or read. Students or families do not need to provide notification before they attend and there is no cost for this supervision. If students wish to attend breakfast in the Dining Hall then they are to swipe in using their Student Card and the associated cost will be added to their TAS Account. There is no specific academic support available to students at this time of the day. This gives students a safe and guiet place to work on their own.

Afternoon Program (3:30pm–6pm Mondays to Thursdays for Years 6-8)

The library will be staffed from 4 to 6pm. The staff will be overseeing students working quietly in the library and assisting them with organising and completing their homework. They will be able to give general guidance, but is not there to provide specific tutoring in areas of concern.

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF STUDIES

Friday Afternoon Program (3:30pm - 5:30pm for Years 6-12)

The library will be open for all students in Years 6 to 12 to work quietly until 5:30pm. There is no specific academic support available during this time. There is no cost for students accessing the library in this time, nor do they need to book in.

Tutoring

A separate tutorial schedule, is available to students in Literacy and Numeracy from 3.45pm - 5pm for students in Years 6 - 8. Day students accessing specific tutoring sessions will be charged \$15 per afternoon. Tutors will keep rolls and the charges associated with these sessions will be added to TAS accounts each month. It is best, though not compulsory, for us to know if you want your child booked into these tutoring sessions. Families can do this by contacting Mrs Vickey O'Brien (vobrien@as.edu.au or 6776 5806) for more details.

Boarders attending these sessions must sign out of the house in the normal manner and return by the required time. There is no additional cost for boarders as out of hours support is already part of the Schedule of Fees for 2019.

Day students are able to access dinner in the Dining Hall from 5:30pm and will do so by swiping their Student Card at the door. The cost associated with dinner (approx. \$6 per meal) will be added to their TAS account. Day students must be collected from the school by 6pm. Families are to arrange directly with their child when and where they will be collected.

Junior School Trip to Tezukayama in Osaka, Japan

On the first day of the holidays, a group of students from Year 4, 5 and 6 travelled to Osaka in Japan to visit Tezukayama School.

Our host families were waiting for us at the airport. That is when I first met Miho, Larry and Ririka. They took me home to their house where I stayed with them for the next 10 days.

We went to school each day with our host families. In Japan most people travel to school by public transport. They catch trams, trains and buses and don't need their parents help to do it!

When we first arrived at school we had to change out of shoes and into our slippers which we wore every time we went inside.

We did lots of different activities during school time. We decorated silk scarves, practiced writing calligraphy, we made our own Japanese fans and helped our host families with their English lessons.

Every day we ate our lunch in the dining room. Unlike at boarders lunch at TAS, everybody had the same food. You have to wait until everyone is ready and then you say ITADAKIMASU and then it's ok to eat.

On the last day we got to pound cooked rice with a big hammer to make mochi. All the Japanese kids cheered us on as we banged the hot cooked rice until it turned into a white, sticky, doughy mochi. We then got to roll it into balls and the kitchen staff cooked it for us for lunch. A highlight of the trip was our trip to Kyoto. We visited the Golden Temple, we crept along the Nightingale floor at Nijojo castle, we went to a samurai park where movies are made and saw a street performer and a sumarai presentation. We got to sleep on futons on the floor in our hotel room and wear kimonos like traditional Japanese people. Moore Sensei introduced us to Coolish- the most delicious ice cream I have ever had.

I can't wait for our Japanese friends to come and visit us later this year. If you ever get the chance to go on the TEZ trip, you should definitely go. We all had such a wonderful time and made lots and lots of new friends!!

Welcome to 2019 and the raft of Challenge events which make up both the Triple Crown and our overall program. The first event on the calendar for this year is the 2km Coffs Ocean Swim on 7 April, followed by the Tour de Rocks on 11-13 April. (https://www.tourderocks. com.au).

The Tour de Rocks is an amazing event, comprising a three day 259km ride from Armidale to South West Rocks, inspiring communities to find a cure for cancer. In 2018 the event raised \$221,400 all of which goes back into the local community (https://docs.wixstatic.com/ ugd/796b80_1344c69ae59d4518bd40a3 de495b4c0f.pdf). This year organisers are hoping to reach \$250,000. The ride is fully catered, with riders and support crew camping the two nights of the event. TAS then arranges accommodation on Saturday night (at South West Rocks) and we all join in the final dinner on Saturday night.

Dates: Thursday 1 - Saturday 13 April (Ride), returning to Armidale Sunday 14 April midday.

Cost: Student riders \$400 plus \$250 fundraising (through raffles tickets) or pay the charge.

Adult supporters \$420 plus \$250 fundraising (through raffles tickets) or pay the charge.

Adult riders \$450 plus \$250 fundraising (through raffles tickets) or pay the charge.

By utilising the raffle tickets, riders can virtually halve the cost of the ride. This is a very good way to also present the Tour to the wider community. Charges for the Tour will be spread out over two terms so as to minimise the financial burden. This charge covers all meals whilst on the ride, bike maintenance, hydration, snacks, supper amongst the TAS group (drinks for supporters) etc as well as an official Tour de Rocks cycling jersey. Accommodation on the ride is in tents, provided by TAS along with sleeping mats, cutlery, plates and cups. This also includes Accommodation on Saturday night, the Tour Dinner, breakfast Sunday as well as return transport to Armidale.

Training times will be organised once final numbers have been submitted. Mark Bullen (Armidale Bicycle Centre) is happy to assist all TAS riders before and during the event, especially with bike set-up.

The International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme's Transdisciplinary Framework

"Transdisciplinary learning in the PYP refers to learning that is not confined within the boundaries of traditional subjects but is supported and enriched by them." (IBO 2018)

The Primary Years Programme (PYP) has a commitment to student learning in a transdisciplinary context, embedded in the curriculum framework and connected across key elements of the programme: concepts, approaches to learning, knowledge and action. The transdisciplinary approach provides continuous integration and connection of prior knowledge and experiences and is the most meaningful way to broaden student understanding about the world.

A transdisciplinary approach encourages the learners' curiosity, questions and voice between and beyond the confines of subjects. There are six transdisciplinary themes, which are universal and can be explored regardless of where PYP students are in the world and with which ethnic or cultural group they identify. The themes are globally and socially driven and provide the opportunity for students to be provided with learning experiences that are not bound by traditional subject areas. (IBO 2018) Our JS teachers have carefully planned a rich programme of inquiry (POI) which integrates two or more subject areas in each theme. These will be explored in greater detail next week.

PYP Transdisciplinary Themes

- Who we are
- Where we are in place and time
- How we express ourselves
- How the world works
- How we organise ourselves
- Sharing the planet

Transdisciplinarity provokes the learner into reflecting on, and recognising, what he or she believes about the world and about his or her place in it. In his seminal work, Freire (2005:81) believed

"students, as they are increasingly posed with problems relating to themselves in the world and with the world, will feel increasingly challenged and obliged to respond to that challenge." In line with the IB mission statement, which challenges all members of IB World Schools to "create a better and more peaceful world" (IBO 2017:7).
